### **USER GUIDANCE**

Gender equality is a social, political, and economic theory advocating for equal rights, opportunities, and treatment for individuals of all genders, irrespective of their biological sex. It is founded on the principle that gender should not determine one's status, rights, or access to resources and opportunities within society. The theory of gender equality encompasses various dimensions, including legal, social, economic, and cultural aspects, and it seeks to challenge and dismantle gender-based discrimination and stereotypes. Gender is a key concept for understanding how inequality and equality arise. Gender comes from the English word gender and refers to social and cultural sex. It includes the perceptions and beliefs about what is female and male in society. It is also referred to as social constructions of gender. Gender is not static but constantly changing and looks different in different cultures, eras and in different parts of the world.

We create different, invisible rules norms, customs, expectations, about male and female in our society, a gender contract. It is characterized by three basic principles:

- Women and men are kept apart
- The male is valued more than the female.
- Everyone is involved in creating the gender order

### **Keywords:**

**Social norms** are based on underlying values. Norms and values are part of a culture. Social norms, or simply norms, is a term for widely shared, but often implicit, rules and expectations of behavior that apply within a small social community or in society at large. It is often believed that biological differences between women and men influence their behavior, for example that men are more mathematical and women more nurturing. But there is no clear scientific evidence for this. There is research showing that women's and men's brains are slightly different, but it cannot be said that this determines their behavior. Environment, upbringing, interests and culture play a much bigger role. People of the same sex can have brains with much greater differences.

**Equal Rights and Opportunities:** Gender equality theory asserts that all individuals, regardless of their gender identity, should have equal rights under the law. This includes the right to vote, work, access education, own property, and participate in political and social life without facing discrimination or restrictions based on gender.

**Social Norms and Stereotypes:** Gender equality theory recognizes the harmful impact of social norms and stereotypes that reinforce traditional gender roles and expectations. It argues that these norms limit individuals' choices and opportunities and contribute to gender-based discrimination.

**Equal Pay and Economic Empowerment:** A fundamental aspect of gender equality is achieving equal pay for equal work. This means that individuals should receive the same remuneration and opportunities for advancement regardless of their gender. The theory emphasizes that economic empowerment is critical for achieving gender equality.



**Health and Reproductive Rights:** Gender equality extends to the realm of health and reproductive rights. It advocates for individuals' autonomy over their bodies, including decisions about reproductive health, family planning, and access to healthcare services.

**Education and Representation:** Gender equality theory emphasizes the importance of equal access to quality education and representation in decision-making processes. It argues that everyone, regardless of gender, should have the opportunity to pursue their educational and career aspirations.

**Intersectionality:** Gender equality theory acknowledges that individuals may experience multiple forms of discrimination based on factors such as race, ethnicity, class, sexual orientation, and disability. Intersectionality highlights the need to address the unique challenges faced by individuals at the intersections of multiple identities.

**Legal Protections:** Achieving gender equality often involves enacting and enforcing laws and policies that protect individuals from gender-based discrimination, harassment, and violence. Legal measures are essential for upholding the principles of gender equality in society.

**Cultural Change:** Gender equality theory recognizes the role of culture in shaping beliefs and behaviors related to gender. It advocates for cultural change to challenge harmful practices and promote more inclusive and equitable norms.

**Global Perspective:** Gender equality is a global issue, and the theory emphasizes the importance of addressing gender disparities on a global scale. It recognizes that gender equality requires international cooperation and solidarity.

**Ongoing Advocacy:** Gender equality is not a static goal but an ongoing process that requires continuous advocacy, awareness-raising, and policy development. The theory encourages individuals and organizations to work collectively to advance gender equality.

**Theory of domination techniques** are a form of social manipulation that happens consciously or unconsciously when a person or group wants to maintain their privileged position. Domination techniques are used both online and offline, and can happen in a visible or invisible hierarchy toward another group or a specific individual. Some examples could include:

- Invisibility
- Being ignored
- Ridicule
- Insulting or mocking you
- Withholding information
- Not getting important information you need
- Objectification

In summary, the theory of gender equality seeks to create a world where individuals of all genders can live free from discrimination, enjoy equal opportunities, and participate fully in society. It recognizes that achieving gender equality is a complex



and multifaceted endeavor that involves addressing legal, social, economic, and cultural factors to create a more just and equitable world for all.

Along with relevant topics and learning resources to guide discussions and learning in non-formal settings, preventing gender-based violence requires education and awareness. Here are four learning activities aimed at raising awareness and promoting understanding and empathy to prevent gender-based violence:

- 1. **Gender** Sensitivity Workshops: Conduct workshops that focus on the concepts of gender equality, stereotypes, and societal expectations. Participants can engage in discussions and activities that challenge traditional gender roles, emphasize the importance of respect, and explore how these roles can perpetuate violence. Encourage open dialogue, sharing of personal experiences, and group discussions to foster empathy and understanding.
- 2. **Interactive Role-Play Scenarios:** Create role-play scenarios that address different forms of gender-based violence, such as verbal harassment, emotional abuse, or workplace discrimination. Participants can take on different roles and act out situations to understand the dynamics of violence and learn how to respond effectively. Encourage reflection and discussion after each scenario to explore alternatives and solutions.
- 3. **Media Literacy Workshops:** Teach individuals, especially young people, to critically analyze and deconstruct media messages that perpetuate gender stereotypes and objectification. Use real-world examples from popular media, advertisements, and social media to highlight how these messages can contribute to violence. Encourage participants to create their own counter-narratives and positive representations of gender.
- 4. **Community Engagement Projects:** Engage participants in community projects that promote gender equality and violence prevention. This could include organizing awareness campaigns, participating in local events, or collaborating with organizations that focus on gender-based violence prevention. Encourage participants to actively apply what they have learned in the workshops to create positive change in their communities.
