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USER GUIDANCE

DESCRIPTION:

The Intergenerational Dialogue module focuses on equipping participants with the knowledge and skills needed to address Honor-Related Violence (HRV). It comprises three units that explore cultural influences, intergenerational transmission of violence, and strategies for building empathy across generations. Through engaging activities like a simulation and group work, participants develop critical thinking, cultural competency, and empathy. The module emphasizes the transformative potential of open dialogue, encouraging participants to recognize the possibility of change while preserving cultural heritage.

GOAL:

The Intergenerational Dialogue module aims to enhance understanding, critical thinking and empathy to address Honour Related Violence (HRV). Through activities such as simulated intergenerational dialogue, it develops critical thinking skills and emphasises the power of dialogue. The Generational Solutions activity focuses on analyzing patterns of behavior and understanding the impact of parental behavior and social demographics on the transmission of violence. The generational mural encourages creative expression to appreciate diversity and foster empathy. These goals empower participants to advocate for change, break the cycle of HRV, and help build a safer community.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE FACILITATOR:



The facilitator is allowed to modify the exercises to better suit the young people in the group.

The following suggestions pertain to potential adaption opportunities:

- To adapt the Intergenerational Dialogue module for a younger audience, start by understanding the group's dynamics, incorporating their backgrounds and experiences. Customize scenarios in the simulation to align with their cultural context for increased engagement.
- During group activities, offer flexibility in formation, allowing participants to choose roles or encouraging a mix for diverse perspectives. Encourage the sharing of personal experiences for authentic discussions.
- Facilitate open-ended post-activity discussions, promoting genuine dialogue. In the Generational Mural activity, accommodate various forms of expression, ensuring authenticity in contributions.
- Be adaptable with time management, letting discussions evolve naturally. Integrate technology judiciously if aligned with preferences. Consider peer facilitation to empower participants and foster teamwork.

Maintain situational awareness, adjusting facilitation promptly for a positive, responsive, and inclusive learning environment.

ACTIVITIES

A3.5 Intergenerational Dialogue Simulation

Activity Name	Intergenerational Dialogue Simulation
Goals	To simulate intergenerational dialogues and encourage participants to explore different perspectives on Honor-Related Violence (HRV) within their community.
Description	Step1: Divide participants into small groups (3-4 people) Step2: Assign roles to participants within each group: some play the role of young activists advocating for change, some as traditional elders preserving cultural heritage, and others as parents struggling to balance tradition and progress.



	Step3: Provide each group with a scenario related to HBV within a fictional diaspora community. Include details about a specific HRV incident and the community's response to it. Step4: Each group conducts a simulated dialogue, with participants portraying their assigned roles. Encourage participants to express their viewpoints authentically, considering the perspectives and values of their assigned roles. Step5: After the simulation, facilitate a group discussion where each group shares their experiences and what they have learned

A3.6 Generational Solutions

Activity Name	Generational Solutions
Goals	To uncover patterns of violence across generations and brainstorm solutions for breaking the cycle.
Description	 Step1: Participants are divided into small groups (3-4 people) and share personal family stories related to violence, focusing on different generations. Each group chooses one representative story to share with the larger group. Step2: After listening to the representative stories, each group discusses commonalities or patterns they observe, considering triggers, behaviors, and cultural factors. Groups note down these patterns on a shared board or chart paper. Step3: Groups brainstorm practical and innovative solutions and strategies for breaking the cycle of violence within families. Step4: Each group presents one observed pattern and one proposed solution to the larger group. Presentations should be concise, focusing on key points. Step5: After presentations, facilitate a brief discussion where participants can ask questions and offer feedback on the presented solutions.

A3.7 Generational Mural: Unity in Diversity

Activity Name	Generational Mural: Unity in Diversity
Goals	To explore generational perspectives on violence prevention through collaborative artistic expression, emphasizing unity in diversity.
Description	Step1: Participants are divided into small groups (3-4 people). Participants discuss and brainstorm the generational perspectives on violence prevention within their families or communities. Step2: Provide a large blank canvas or mural paper and art supplies (paints, brushes, markers, etc.). Each participant, representing a different generation, contributes to the mural by painting or drawing symbols, images, or messages that represent their generational perspective on violence prevention (e.g a draw of a family gathered around a dinner table, a draw of puzzle pieces fitting together, or text with positive messages). Step3: Below or beside the mural, participants write brief narrative captions explaining the symbols or images they contributed and the generational perspective they represent. Step4: Groups present their completed murals to the entire group. After presentations, facilitate a reflection session where participants discuss the mural's themes, symbols, and the unity portrayed despite generational differences. Step5: Participants brainstorm actionable steps for promoting unity and communication across generations within their families and communities.
